No experience is necessary, all tools are provided, though bringing your own is perfectly acceptable, and lunch will be served to volunteers in appreciation of their willingness to build with Habitat.

Some are family and friends of our homeowners, some are students and some are organizations that seek to lend a helping hand in the communities they serve. Regardless, we can all make a difference by working together and building alongside families in need in Vigo County.
